#### DID YOU KNOW??

The Episcopalian shield was officially adopted by the General Convention of 1940 and is full of symbolism. The red cross on a while field is an ancient Christian symbol - white representing the purity of Jesus and the red representing His sacrifice on the cross and the blood of Christian martyrs. The red cross is also known as the Cross of St. George (patron saint of England) and indicates the Episcopal Church's decent from the Church of England. The blue field in the upper left is the color traditionally associated with the Blessed Virgin Mary and is symbolic of Jesus' human nature which He received from His mother. The Xshaped cross is the cross of St. Andrew (patron saint of Scotland) and recalls the Episcopal Church's indebtedness to the Scottish Episcopal Church for the consecration of its first bishop, Samuel Seabury as Bishop of Connecticut in 1784. The St Andrew's cross is made up of 9 smaller crosslets which represent the 9 original American dioceses which met in Philadelphia in 1789 to adopt the constitution of the Episcopal Church. These include: Connecticut, Maryland, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, South Carolina, Virginia, and Delaware.


